From the Pastor....

Dear Members and Friends of Old Saratoga,

Greetings to you and your families in the grace and peace of Christ!

The season of Lent is more than halfway over. Soon Holy Week will be here (April 9-15) and then Easter (April 16)

Since the big winter storm we had on March 14-15, it has been cold and. dreary. Spring is here, but we can hardly tell it. We're waiting for the snow to melt; for the warmth of the sun; for signs that "...now the winter is past, the rain is over and gone. The flowers appear on the earth; the time of singing has come, and the voice of the turtledove is heard in our land." (Song of Solomon 2:11-12)

In these weeks of Lent, as our bodies long for warmth and light, we may also find that our spirits do the same. Around us and within, there are cold powers of anger, death and despair that chill the hopes of many for an easier life and a better world. Spirits are dampened by fear and anxiety not only about today, but about what the future will hold.

In these unsettling times, we remember what Jesus said to his disciples just before his trial and execution in Jerusalem: "In the world you have tribulation, but be of good cheer, I have overcome the world." (John 16:33) He testified that God was with him—and that in him, his followers would "have peace." (vs. 33)

They did eventually find peace, but not right away. The unfolding crisis of Jesus' suffering and death shook their faith. In confusion and fear, they betrayed, denied and abandoned Jesus in his darkest hours—which became their darkest hours too.

It wasn't until after the Resurrection of Jesus that they could be of "good cheer". The world had not changed, but something happened to their grieving spirits when Jesus came back to them and spoke his word of peace.

His words and risen presence were as new life to them. They knew then that their failures were forgiven; that he had never stopped loving them; that there was nothing in life or death that could ever separate them from the Love of God that overcomes death and all the sin of the world—including theirs.

From that time on, the disciples knew the Gift of Resurrection. They too had been raised up from "death" to life! They could now begin to see that there was nothing in creation stronger than God's everlasting Love!

So let us, like the disciples, take heart! Be of good cheer! Christ is Risen—and he is with us always in this world of tribulation. He gives us courage to love and forgive; he blesses our spirits with hope and peace; he calls us one and all to live in a way that gives new life to the world!

May you and your families be blessed with God's Love and Peace this Easter and always! *Yours in Christ,*

HYMNS OF OUR FAITH

"Sing to the Lord, you saints of God; praise his holy name." (Psalm 30:4) "What Wondrous Love Is This" "What wondrous Love is this, O my soul, O my soul, What wondrous love is this, O my soul! What wondrous love is this, that caused the Lord of bliss To bear the dreadful curse for my soul, for my soul, To bear the dreadful curse for my soul!"

A look at this hymn continues the theme of the last article written for this newsletter. That theme is the very personal nature of God's love, and the reason why the divine was willing to give up heaven's glory to live among us, and ultimately give his life for our salvation. The key words of last month's hymn (O Love How Deep) were "for us." In "What wondrous Love is This" the continuing theme finds its expression in the words "for my soul."

The hymn is written in the first person and addresses the writer's past, present, and future relationship with God - at one time "sinking down," but rescued by a loving God - and, at some time in the future, being set free from death to forever sing God's praise. In every case the writer acknowledges that God's work was, is, and will be "for my soul."

There is not a lot to tell about the origin or composer, since the references to author and composer are noted as "Anonymous." Hymnologists regard the text as an

"Appalachian Folk Hymn," and the music as an "Appalachian Folk Melody." So we are blessed with heavenly thoughts and music without the need to give praise to humankind!. Very refreshing!

"To God and to the Lamb I will sing...... To God and to the Lamb, who is the great "I Am," While millions join the theme, I will sing."

SETTING THE DATE OF EASTER April 16

People are always asking: Why does the date of Easter vary from year to year? Last year it was March 27. This year it is three weeks later on April 16! Here is how Easter is set:

- 1) The date of the spring (vernal) equinox is March 20.
- 2) The first full moon after the equinox is on April 11.
- Easter is always the first Sunday after the first full moon that follows the Spring Equinox! This year that Sunday is April 16.

PROPERTY COMMITTEE REPORT

The church recently received a letter from the village Code Enforcement Officer, Gil Albert, informing us of a mandatory inspection. Mr. Albert came to the church, inspected, and found the following violations:

- 1. Handrail to the basement needs replacement
- 2. Carbon monoxide detectors need to be installed
- 3. Emergency lighting needs to be installed
- 4. Remove door from back stairs to choir loft for better egress in an emergency
- 5. Commercial stove in kitchen needs a legal hood with fire suppression

Mr. Albert will return to see that these items are brought into compliance.

The committee met and began addressing the concerns. **Doug Sheely** was hired to replace the handrail into the basement, and in doing so, found that the stairs were not well attached to the plate. He repaired that for us as well. Members of the committee are now investigating replacing the old gas stove with a commercial electric stove, and placing four emergency lights at or near the exits, which will come on in the event of a power outage at a time when the church is being used. The door in question will be removed.
