"THIS TIME AROUND"

Toes were tapping and smiles abounded at OSRC on Sunday, April 23, when *This Time* Around, a local folk group, joined the congregation in worship. They sang with the choir in an introit and responses, and led the congregation in the last hymn. They also sang the prelude, a haunting rendition of the Peter, Paul and Mary hit "All My Trials." We thank our Minister of Music, Christopher Tucker, who is a member of This Time Around, for bringing the group to worship with us!

STAINED GLASS TREASURES

Among the treasures found in OSRC are the stained glass windows. These windows, while being amazing works of art, also tell stories. The windows give reference to biblical truths and in most cases remind us of a few of the saints of God in the Schuyler-ville community who have preceded us, most of the windows having been gifts to the church in memory of loved ones.



Stained glass windows have existed in churches and monasteries since the 7th century in Britain. Many depict episodes from the life of Christ and have been utilized in support of worship and as a tool of learning. It has been reported that many people of medieval history learned about the life of Christ through the stories depicted in the stained glass windows. This was especially important due to wide-spread illiteracy.

The New York Landmarks Conservancy is sponsoring a program of Sacred Sites Open Houses for the purpose of inviting the public to view stained glass windows, with suggested dates being 5/21,22. While plans for Old Saratoga are still in the development stages, we are most likely to open our church doors on 5/20 or 21 in the afternoon hours for public viewing of our windows. It is also likely that portions of our worship sevice may be devoted to stories that the windows tell. It is suggested that readers keep an eye on the church website, area news publications, and the outdoor bulletin board

HYMNS OF OUR FAITH

"Sing to the Lord, you saints of God; praise his holy name." (Psalm 30:4)

"I heard the voice of Jesus say, Come unto me and rest; Lay down, O weary one, lay down your head upon my breast.

I came to Jesus as I was, weary, worn and sad; I found in him a resting place, and he has made me glad."

This hymn is a most interesting composition. One quickly recognizes two distinct parts: an invitation from Jesus, and the listener's response. The invitations are expressed by the composer of the music, John B. Dykes, in the somber key of G minor; the listener's responses in the happier key of G major. Each of the three verses, written by Horatio Bonar, is structured around invitations offered by Jesus in the gospels. Summarized, using the words of the hymn, Jesus offers "rest,"" living water," and "light." The hymn writer goes on in the second part of each verse to explain the satisfaction derived from the listener's response to each invitation.

Horatio Bonar lived in the 19th century, was a minister in the Free Church of Scotland, and was a religious poet and hymn writer, authoring more than 600 hymns. It is said of him that he had an intimidating appearance, but was a great lover of children and was concerned about how children understood the psalms that were sung in his day.

It is the prayer of this writer that through our times of worship, our prayer life and the study of God's Word, we hear the voice of Jesus speaking to us; speaking to our individual need; speaking in times of hope and despair. May the sound of his voice bring peace and joy to our hearts.
