## ***From the Pastor ...***

*Ever since the creation of the world,  
God's eternal power and divine nature,  
invisible though they are,  
have been understood and seen  
through the things God has made.  
(Romans 1:20)*

Dear Members and Friends of Old Saratoga,

Greetings to you and your families in the grace and peace of Christ.

On Sunday, October 2, we will celebrate World Communion and conclude our series of sermons in the Season of Creation. The sermon will include a remembrance of St. Francis of Assisi, born in the 13<sup>th</sup> century, whose feast day is celebrated on October 4. St. Francis lived an amazing and generous life of love, and respect, for all God's creation and is fondly known as the patron saint of animals.

St. Francis was one who understood the above quote from Romans 1, that God's eternal power and divine nature... can be seen and understood through the things that God has made. He spent his life praising God and giving his attention to the gifts of the Great Creator.

Autumn is a special season to celebrate the gifts of God in nature and learn their lessons for life. I'm thinking especially of the deciduous trees and how they change at this time of year. Despite a lack of rain, we hope to see the blazing colors of red, orange and yellow soon transforming the leaves of maples, oaks, poplars, birches and others.

This amazing process when leaves turn color and eventually fall from the trees is called "abscission." It happens in preparation for the winter months when trees "rest" and the leaves aren't needed as they are in spring and summer to make food for the tree and help control the water intake. It is beneficial for the tree to rest during the cold time of year when natural growth is inhibited. And thus, the tree, in its God-given wisdom, produces a gas called "ethylene" which affects the leaf cells and their stem connection to the tree. The leaves begin to age rapidly when the green chlorophyll disappears and exposes the colorful pigments that have been there all along, but hidden. Finally, the leaf separates from the tree and falls to the ground. The tree then remains dormant in the winter until spring comes, when its natural hormones awaken a new cycle of growth.

What can we learn from trees at rest? Maybe, for one thing, that in all the seasons of our lives, activity and rest need to be in balance. If we don't make down-time to rest our minds and bodies, we can feel overcome with exhaustion, or anxiety, and unable to focus or think creatively. Neurological research is showing that too much work and activity, and constant connection to digital devices impairs the brain's ability to learn, reflect, and make meaning.

Trees in autumn remind us of the need to rest and quiet our minds, to experience the beauty and love of the Grace that surrounds us—and to receive of the gifts God gives to renew and heal our lives with love, hope and peace.

## HYMNS OF OUR FAITH

***"Sing to the Lord, you saints of his: praise his holy name." Psalm 30:4***

***"Master, the tempest is raging, the billows are tossing high!***

***The sky is o'ershadowed with blackness, no shelter or help is nigh!"***

"Master, the Tempest is Raging" is, to my way of thinking, more of an anthem than a traditional hymn. Based on the New Testament story of Jesus calming the storm-tossed Sea of Galilee, as recorded by three of the Gospel writers, the "anthem" is filled with drama. Sung loudly, in a desperate, pleading manner ("Carest thou not that we perish?") it crescendos to the fear of a "grave in the angry deep" but then decrescendos to an almost whispered "Peace, be still." This hymn or anthem is a great way to get warmed up for a hymn sing. The song was written by Mary A. Baker, a Chicago resident and member of the Baptist denomination, in 1874. It came at the request of Dr. H.R. Palmer, who desired several songs on the subject of a series of Sunday School lessons for that year. The song's popularity has increased over the years reaching a high point in the 1980's.

The anthem, or hymn, if you prefer, would be of particular significance to worshipers at Old Saratoga Reformed during the recent month of September, as Pastor Joyce presented a series of sermons during the liturgical "Season of Creation." The sermons were devoted to increasing an understanding of the God of Creation, the God who created the sky, the oceans, the land and all living things. He is the God of the storm and the calm. Our God is near in every situation; omnipresent and omniscient. In the "storms" of our lives, it is important for us to be mindful that the God of Creation is near; that God is in control of our destiny; that all creation "obeys God's will." "Peace! Peace! Be still!"
