#### JAMAICA MISSION TRIP REPORT

From June 29-July 6, the mission team from our partner church, First Presbyterian in Oneonta, stayed at the Pringle Home for Children where they celebrated their 25<sup>th</sup> year of mission partnership. OSRC was unable to send people this year, but sent a gift of \$1500 to help the Pringle Home. **Bonnie Manes**, trip organizer, wrote this note: "Your monetary gift was greatly appreciated by the Pringle Director and staff and was much needed for the start of their school year..."

Bonnie wrote in her church newsletter that the mission "team worked diligently the whole week: cutting sawing, nailing, cleaning, sanding, painting, laying counter top tiles, replacing or scrubbing cupboard doors and knobs, and refurbishing a large section of the kitchen that was so needed!.. Because the lumber and supplies did not cost as much as expected, we were able to purchase a much needed new refrigerator and a weed-wacker for them. OSRC also donated a monetary gift which will help buy school supplies and shoes for the girls...."

Bonnie added this about the 25<sup>th</sup> Anniversary Celebration: "The church service was nearly three hours long and we enjoyed every inspiring, lively moment of it, even though it did become a bit too loud at times! After church, several Pringle girls joyously helped us hang our decorations and then we set tables with a red heart motif complete with tablecloths, plates, plastic ware, cups and heart straws! All the staff was invited along with some other church personnel, as we totally cooked and served the celebratory meal. It was a heartfelt 25 year celebration in a room decorated and filled with a lifetime of love!! Thanks be to God!"

#### HYMNS OF OUR FAITH

"Sing to the Lord, you saints of his: praise his holy name." Psalm 30:4 "I Sing the Mighty Power of God"

"I sing the mighty power of God that made the mountain rise,

That spread the flowing seas abroad and built the lofty skies,

I sing the wisdom that ordained the sun to rule by day:

The moon shines full at his command and all the stars obey."

Isaac Watts (1674-1748) was writing original hymns in a day when most Protestant churches sang only Psalms. Watts, a Dissenter, or Non-Conformist from the liturgical practices of the established (State) church in England, went on to write 750 hymns, the majority of them in a period of over just two years. Forty-three of Watts' hymns are often sung in our day and include "Joy to the World," and "O God Our Help in Ages Past."


In the singing of "I Sing the Mighty Power of God," God's creative power is celebrated. "He formed the creatures with his word and then pronounced them good." There is not a wonder of any kind, a cloud, a mountain, a sea, that exists without the work of God's hand. Everywhere that Watts looked he saw God's creative work. Without a doubt, the hymn writer was familiar with the words of Psalm 19, vs. 1, "The heavens declare the glory of God: the skies proclaim the work of his hands." Hymnologist Richard J. Stanislaw has commented on the frequent use of the word "I" in this hymn, indicative of the hymn writer's confidence that all of life is in God's care, and that the author's declarations and beliefs go well beyond an "abstract nature worship."

It is interesting to note that this hymn was originally part of a hymnal written by Isaac Watts for children. Today it is a hymn to be sung in a lively and grateful manner by children and adults alike.
