Dear Members and Friends of Old Saratoga,

Greetings to you in the grace and peace of Christ!

A few weeks before Christmas, our church treasurer, Chris Garney, contacted me to set up a meeting date at the church. It was to be a special meeting with Mark Bertrand, who with his wife Kelly, founded the The Giving Circle in 2005. I asked about the purpose of the meeting, but was told it was a surprise and I would have to wait to find out!

After the date of December 19 was set, I contacted Pastor Jenn to invite her to come as well. Around 10 AM, we happily welcomed Mark and his wife Kelly Bertrand (who live in Schuylerville). The five of us sat around the small table outside the church office.

Mark then told us the purpose of the meeting. He and Kelly had brought with them a small black box which contained a gift for the church. He took a lovely (and weighty!) tear-shaped glass object from the box and explained that it was a **Compassion Award** which The Giving Circle presents every year to groups who have supported the local and/or international work of The Giving Circle in that year.

Jesus fully embodied God's unconditional love and compassion. He calls us to a life of compassion "for all that God has made" through our love for others and the creation, being faithful friends, helping those in need, doing good deeds, and trying to feel what others feel. CHRISTMAS APPEAL UPDATE

The Annual Christmas Letter of Appeal went out in December and has been generously supported by the members and friends of Old Saratoga Reformed Church. To date, the gifts have totaled \$5195. The consistory is grateful for all gifts, both large and small, which help to continue funding our expenses when attendance is sporadic during the winter months, due to weather and illness.

WORSHIP NEWS

The congregation voted, by a 2 to 1 majority, to

return to using the traditional Lord's Prayer.
The Worship Committee thanks all those who voted and/or made thoughtful comments.
In reading over these comments, it was discovered that there are some misconceptions about the Lord's Prayer, and this gives an opportunity to explain a little about the history and traditions associated with this much-loved prayer.

Our church historian, **Dick Behrens**, has been researching the prayer, and has written an article which may be found in this issue of the newsletter. We hope that you will take a moment to read it and learn something that will make the Lord's Prayer even more meaningful to you.

Last June, we began to have members and friends participate in the Prayers of Thanksgiving and Intercession. We do this on the last Sunday of the month, and call it "Prayers of the People." Three people each take a portion of the prayer (Thanksgiving, Intercession for local people and concerns, or Intercession for the wider world.) We currently have a list of people who have volunteered to do this. They either write their own 4-5 sentence portion of the prayer, or find one that is appropriate for the portion they are going to do. It would be wonderful if others in the congregation felt as though they would like to do this as well. Please see Duffy Whitehouse if you would like to volunteer. Duffy Whitehouse, Worship Chr.

WEATHER AND HEAT IN WINTER

Please remember that the temperature in the sanctuary on Sunday mornings may not be what you are used to at home. It is a good idea to wear an extra layer and boots when you come to worship. It is warmer in the front, too, as the opening and closing of the doors does not affect the temperature as much as in the back. On stormy Sundays, there will still be a worship service. Please come, only if you feel safe doing so.

HYMNS OF OUR FAITH

"Sing to the Lord, you saints of his; praise his holy name." (Psalm 30: 4)
"Jesus, Thou Joy of Loving Hearts"
"Jesus, thou joy of loving hearts, thou fount of life, thou joy of all,

From the best bliss that earth imparts, we turn unfilled to heed thy call."

The words of this hymn are attributed to Bernard of Clairveaux, and are excerpted from one of the many poems which he wrote. In 1858, the original Latin text was translated into English by Dr. Ray Palmer, a Congregational minister from Albany, NY.

Bernard of Clairveux lived during the 12th century. "A nobleman by birth, (he) gave up his life of luxury to become a monk. Having tasted 'the bliss that earth imparts' he knew that he was 'unfilled and turned to Jesus instead."

As we close out the season of Epiphany we see an element of the season included in Bernard's first verse where Jesus is referred to as "thou light of all". In the following four stanzas of the hymn we have enumerated other attributes ascribed to Jesus, the "joy of loving hearts", "truth unchanged", the "fountainhead", and "living bread".

While reading, or singing the text, we come to realize that it is a prayer of praise celebrating the gifts that life centered in Jesus affords -goodness, joy, filling of our souls, love, and peace.

As we anticipate the coming of the Lenten season-a time of soul-searching, contemplation, and sacrifice, we might well think upon the example set by Bernard of Clairveaux. He found the greatest riches, not in the comfort of wealth and earthly pleasures, but rather in the things of God and service to others.

"O Jesus, ever with us stay, make all our moments calm and bright; Chase the dark night of sin away, shed o'er the world thy holy light."

THE LORD'S PRAYER

"The Lord's Prayer is always in danger of becoming a vain repetition...(people) need to be reminded of what they are doing when the pray the greatest of all prayers...and think a little more when they take the words upon their lips." These words were written by William Barclay, Professor of Divinity and Biblical Criticism at Glasgow University, as an introduction to a treatise on the Lord's Prayer. With Barclay's admonishment in mind, it is good for us to learn more about the origin of the Lord's Prayer, about variations of the prayer within the King James version of the Bible, about the various translations of the Bible that have been made over the 2000 years since the origin of the prayer, and about some of the commentaries of preachers and theologians over time, so that we more fully understand its meaning.

The gospel writer Matthew tells of Jesus instructing the disciples (Matthew 6: 7-8) "And when you pray, do not keep on babbling like pagans, for they think they will be heard because of many words. Do not be like them, for your Father knows what you need before you ask him. This then is how you should pray:

Our Father which art in heaven, Hallowed be thy name. Thy kingdom come, Thy will be done in earth, as it is in heaven. Give us this day our daily bread. And forgive us our debts as we forgive our debtors. And lead us not into temptation, but deliver us from evil: For thine is the kingdom, and the power, and the glory, for ever. Amen.

This, the familiar version of the Lord's Prayer, is found in Matthew 6:9-13. It is the language of the King James Bible translated from the Greek in 1611. The KJV is the 3rd translation into English, having been preceded by the "Great Bible" (1538) and the "Bishop's Bible" (1568) The King James translation was begun in 1602 with the Bishop's Bible authorized the basis.

The Lord's Prayer is also found in Luke11:2-4, but translated a little differently. Luke indicates that the teaching of the prayer was in response to a request from an unidentified disciple: "Lord, teach us to pray, just as John taught his disciples" "He (Jesus) said, "When you pray, say:

Our Father, which art in heaven, Hallowed be thy name. Thy Kingdom come. Thy will be done, as in heaven, so in earth. Give us day by day our daily bread. And forgive us our sins; for we forgive every one that is indebted to us. And lead us not into temptation; but deliver us from evil."

Matthew might have been a witness to this, having been a disciple, but Luke, a disciple of Paul is less likely, since he was a historian with many sources used as a basis for his writing. When we consider the many translations and multiple languages as sources of the Bible text, we can't be certain that the King James Bible Is a direct, verbatim translation of Jesus' words.

If we agree that meaning is of greater significance than the words themselves, than we are able to understand what theologians over time have indicated, as Barclay states, "But what Jesus was doing was giving them (the disciples) a pattern of prayer far more than a form of words which they were to do no more than repeat, like children reciting a lesson." With such an understanding there is fertile ground to examine various forms anmount translations of the Lord's Prayer so that its meaning can enrich our fellowship with our Lord and with each other.

Over the next seven, or so, editions of Jacob's Well, we will explore the Lord's Prayer, section by section. We will consider the writing of a variety of theologians on the prayer, in the hope of being enlightened.
