From Pastor Jenn... (A Letter of Farewell to the Turning Point Reformed Churches)

Dear brothers and sisters in Christ,

Grace to you and peace from God our Father and our Lord Jesus Christ.

As the apostle Paul often opens his letters with gratitude for God and for the people of the church he is writing to, so I give thanks to God and for all of you in my prayers. I especially thank God for His abundant grace, steadfast love, and faithfulness throughout the ages. Over this last year and eight months I have experienced your faith in Jesus Christ, the love that you have for God's people, and how you witness to the grace and love of Jesus Christ in your community. The disciples of the Turning Point Reformed Churches are living out the greatest commandments: "Love the Lord your God with all your heart, mind, and soul and love your neighbor." You have come together in unity as the body of Christ to live in ways that honor and glorify God and to provide care for others. I am thankful that God has placed us on this journey in ministry together. Together we have grown in faith, loved each other, built up and empowered each other, faced challenges of the unknown, and found new ways of living as God's people in this place and time. Thanks be to God for these blessings and opportunities to come closer to Him in relationship and to live each day as disciples on mission with God in the world.

As we embarked on this journey together, there were many unknowns we would face. We did not know what to expect of this program, of each other maybe, or what would come out of all this. Personally, for me the unknowns caused anxiety and worry at times as I did not know what the future held for me and for us. The scriptures that I have read and held close to my heart on this journey are Proverbs 3:5-6, Psalm 23, and John 14:5-6.

Proverbs 3:5-6 says, "Trust in the Lord your God with all your heart, and do not rely on your own insight. In all your ways acknowledge him, and he will make straight your paths."

The Psalmist says, "The Lord is my shepherd, I shall lack nothing. He makes me lie down in green pastures; he leads me beside still waters; he restores my soul. He leads me in right paths for his names sake. Even though I walk through the darkest valley, I fear no evil; for you are with me; your rod and your staff—they comfort me. You prepare a table before me in the presence of my enemies; you anoint my head with oil; my cup overflows. Surely goodness and mercy shall follow me all the days of my life, and I shall dwell in the house of the Lord my whole life long."

John 14:5-6 says, "Thomas said to him, 'Lord, we do not know where you are going, so how can we know the way?' Jesus answered, 'I am the way, the truth, and the life. No one comes to the Father except through me.'" These passages have given me comfort, peace, and hope in times where I may have felt discouraged, stuck, challenged, or feared the unknowns that we would face together. As we read the scriptures, they re-focus and center us in Christ and remind us that we are not alone on this journey. Christ is behind us, with us, and walking before us. We just need to pray, rest in Christ, trust in Him, and listen for how the Holy Spirit is speaking to us, nudging us, and calling us to live as disciples who radiate the love of Christ into the world. Over the past year, we have transformed as a community by growing in our faith through worship and study, in service to our neighbors, and challenging ourselves to find new ways to be in ministry together. Some of the collaborative ministry ideas we came up with are: youth group leadership, a community picnic to get to know our neighbors better, evening bible study, leadership retreats, A Room for All information session, collaborative women's retreat, outreach opportunities, and united worship services with the three congregations. Some of these ideas have already been started and some are still in the planning stages. All these opportunities are exciting new ways of being on mission together to serve and glorify God. Collaborative

ministry is also a way that we visibly unify as the body of Christ yet celebrate and use the different gifts within the body to do ministry together.

As most of you already know, but some do not, I have accepted a call with the First Presbyterian Church of Ballston Spa, NY. I will embark on a new path along my ministry journey on Aug 1st. Over the next month, I will be transitioning out of the Fellowship Program and ministry with you all. My hope is that in this last month I am with you that I get to make visits to as many people as I can especially those in the nursing homes and who are unable to get out, continue to preach, transition the evening bible study leadership from myself to another gifted and equipped leader, continue to empower and equip those leading collaborative ministry ideas, go on a hike with the youth one last time as PJ2 (PJ squared), and to encourage and bless you in the ministry you already are doing and will continue to do in the name of our Lord and Savior. My prayer and hope are that you all continue to do collaborative ministry together long after I leave. I pray you find the things that have worked well so far, continue to look at your mission statements and how to live into those as individual congregations but also as the Turning Point Churches, and also continually listen for how the Holy Spirit is calling you to live into new ways of radiating the love of Christ into the world. God has amazing and awesome new things in store for this community and His people here.

Friends, this is not goodbye, but more of a see you later, or see you around. I have prayed to God and always wanted to feel part of a community. God has blessed and gifted me with His Beloved people from the Turning Point Churches as my community that will forever hold a very special place in my heart. You all have supported me, encouraged me, taught me, challenged me, held me accountable, been gracious to me, loved me, filled my spirit with joy, and showed me what it truly means to live in community as the body of Christ. Whether you are right here in Schuylerville, Bacon Hill or Fort Miller, or hundreds or thousands of miles away, you all will always be my Beloved community in Christ.

May the love of God our Father, the grace and peace of our Lord Jesus Christ, and the presence of the Holy Spirit be with each of us now and forever. Amen.

*“God of our fathers, whose almighty hand

As we approach the 4th of July our thoughts turn to the birth of our nation and the freedom won for us by the founding fathers. “God of Our Fathers” was authored by Daniel C. Roberts, an Episcopal priest in Brandon, VT who had previously served in the cause of freedom as a Private in the 84th Ohio Infantry during the US Civil War. It was written for a Fourth of July celebration in Brandon. It was later chosen to be sung at the Centennial Celebration of the United States of America.

The tune to this song, entitled “National Hymn” was written by George W. Warren, who was born in Albany, NY. Warren was an accomplished organist and composer who served for many years as the organist at St. Thomas Episcopal Church in New York City. “God of Our Fathers” is a salute to our nation, but more importantly, it is a hymn of praise to God for his guidance in the past. God is viewed as our “ruler, guide and stay.” The hymn closes with petitions for God’s continuing presence and aid.

GENERAL SYNOD UPDATE



The 2019 General Synod of the Reformed Church in America met June 6-11 on the campus of Hope College, Holland Michigan. Highlights of the meeting include:

1. The synod voted to do away with the current per-member assessment system, and will by Jan. 2021, implement a new system based on "covenant shares." Each congregation will contribute a flat percentage of its income to help fund the work and ministry of the denomination.
2. A mid-term report was received from the 2020 Vision Task Force regarding the present and future state of the denomination which is currently divided over the inclusion of LGBTQ people. Their final report and recommendation will come at the 2020 Synod meeting. A significant change in how the classes vote to make changes in the RCA Book of Church Order was proposed in regard to the forthcoming report of the 2020 Task Force next year. (That proposed change will be voted on by all the RCA classes this year.

Our Classis President, **Rev Jonathan Vanderbeck**, who attended the Synod meeting, wrote in a letter to classis:

"We will prepare ourselves for what is to come, and trust in the grace of God to sustain us, no matter what happens moving forward."

The Lord's Prayer

(6th in a series)

"Forgive Us Our Debts, As We Forgive Our Debtors"

The discussions and written opinions are almost endless. The debate continues. Which is the correct expression of this portion of the Lord's Prayer? Is it "debts and debtors" trespasses, or sins, that are to be forgiven? Arguments are made based on definitions and translations of words from ancient languages, such as Aramaic and Greek. Matthew, writing in Aramaic, states "debts and debtors" (Matthew 6: 12) Debts, in the narrowest sense, can mean money owed. Its broadest meaning can indicate any moral or religious obligation that we have. Luke, working in the Greek language writes "sins" (Luke 11: 4) In this context, sins refer to a failure to do that which ought to have been done, and which could have been done. The New English Bible reads, "Forgive us the wrongs we have done, as we have forgiven those who have wronged us."

From my readings on the topic, I have concluded that the words debts, debtors, sins, trespasses and wrongs are not the critical elements of this portion of the Lord's Prayer. The indispensable, and most important, concepts are those of forgiveness and forgiving. William Barclay, Scottish theologian, and author of *The Beatitudes and the Lord's Prayer for Everyman*, writes, "a man is never closer and more kin to God than when he forgives a fellowman." Matthew Henry said, "Forgiving our debtors is an extension of God's grace."

To fully understand the necessity to be forgiving it is important to read the verses in Matthew 6 that follow the prayer. Verse 14 reads, "For if you forgive men when they sin against you, your heavenly Father will also forgive you." Then note the sobering words of verse 15. "But if you do not forgive men their sins, your Father will not forgive your sins." (NIV) Matthew Henry comments, "...the condition of forgiveness is a forgiving spirit."

To assist in further understanding forgiveness, here are two suggestions for your consideration: Read "The Parable of the Unmerciful Servant" found in Matthew 18: 21-25. You might also want to go to your computer and view a 10 minute video. Enter "David Dorn- Forgiveness: episode 17."

SECOND QUARTER FINANCIAL UPDATE

We are completing the second quarter of 2019 with the **\$6031.06** in investment income which we carried forward from 2018 used, and another **\$6000** from investment income transferred to our general fund, which I hope will allow us to meet our financial obligations through the end of June. We have also used money from our investment portfolio to make needed improvements to our property (protection of our beautiful stained glass windows) and for the support of the Albany Synod Fellowship Program. We are very grateful for the regular offerings we receive as well as the generous response to our Stewardship request (**\$2300**) and support for our Fund Raisers (**\$1955.62**).

We also support other charities that help people and support causes we believe in both locally and globally. The funds that support these outreach programs are given to us specifically for mission projects and do not come out of the gifts given to support our church.
