From the Pastor...

Dear Members and Friends of Old Saratoga,

Greetings in the Grace of God and the Peace of Christ!

The following poem is one of my favorites at this time of year:

Autumn

The leaves are falling, falling as if from way off, as though far gardens withered in the skies; they are falling with denying gestures.

And in the nights the heavy earth is falling from all the stars down into loneliness.

We are all falling. This hand falls. And look at others: it is in them all.

And yet there is One who holds this falling endlessly gently in his hands.

Rainer Maria Rilke (1875-1926) (translated by M.D. Herter Norton)

The beauty of Autumn, with all its vibrant colors in the apples, pumpkins and leaves on the trees is a wonderful gift of God! It's a time to get outdoors and enjoy the earth before the colors fade and the crops are gathered in!

Glorious autumn is also a bittersweet time of letting go—as the leaves in all their natural colors remind us. As daylight decreases, the tree energy and chemicals change. Leaves that have done their part lose their greenness (chlorophyll) and assume their natural pigments; but then, according to nature's wondrous cycle, they are caused to let go, and they fall "with "denying gestures" to the ground.

The poet sees the falling leaves and recognizes that "we are all falling." I don't take this as a depressing thought, but as a reality of our ever-changing life. I am falling and you are falling. Youth and old age together are falling. Old notions and ways of thinking are falling. The church is falling. Life as we know it is falling. Earth is falling.

"Yet" the poet says, "there is One who holds this falling "endlessly gently in his hands." It is comforting to know that as life changes, God holds us in the falling so that we don't fall alone, afraid or hard.

In this autumn season, remember the words of the Psalmist: "How many are the things you have made O Lord; You have made them all with wisdom." (Psalm 104:24) May we never forget--in all the changes life brings—that there's a deeper Wisdom in all things; and that we and all creation are being held "endlessly gently" in the hands of God.

WORLD COMMUNION SUNDAY Oct. 6

On the first Sunday of October, the Church will celebrate the Lord's Supper around the world, as a reminder that we are "one in Christ" and called by Jesus to minister together in love and service. Though our customs and traditions, our liturgies and languages are different, and though the churches be large or small, we are remembering that Christ is calling us, when we come to the table, to be one in God's love!

OSRC will be celebrating the Sacrament this month by coming forward to the table, and partaking by "intinction" in which the bread is dipped into the juice, rather than using the small cups of juice and trays of bread which are passed.



HYMNS OF OUR FAITH

"Sing to the Lord, you saints of his; praise his holy name." Psalm 30: 4

"Give to the winds your fears, in hope be undismayed; God hears your sighs and counts your tears, God shall lift up your head; Through waves and clouds and storms he gently clears the way; Wait for God's time, so shall the night soon end in joyous day."

The poet (hymnodist) was Paul Gerhardt (1607-1676) a German theologian and Lutheran minister. The hymn is a paraphrase of Psalm 37, in which David speaks of God's providence, urging readers to dispel their fears. We are to trust and delight in the Lord an commit our ways to God's care.

Gerhardt experienced more than his share of grief and could have been perpetually dismayed. He lived through the Thirty Years War in Europe, a conflict which was mostly a religious war. He was 44 years old before he had steady employment as a minister, due to his uncompromising nature concerning the beliefs he held. As a pastor he was often at the center of political and theological controversy. Only one of his five children lived to adulthood, and his wife died in their thirteenth year of marriage. Yet with the confidence he had in God's faithfulness, he went on to serve churches in Mittenwalde, Berlin and Lubben. He wrote 123 hymns, many of which are still in use today. It is said that he ranks next to Luther as the most gifted and popular hymn writer of the Lutheran church, reflecting a serenity that encourages those who sing them to share his simple faith.

The original poem had 16 verses. Presently one can find the hymn published using from two to six verses. It was translated into English in 1739 by John Wesley, an English theologian and evangelist, and musical accompaniment applied in 1868 by George Elvey, and English organist and composer.

OLD SARATOGA TO BEGIN COMMUNITY SOLAR ON NOV.1

Thanks to the research of the Property Committee and the approval of consistory, our church will be increasing its use of renewable energy, starting on Nov. 1.

We will be partnering with **Nexamp**, a local provider of community solar power. (Visit capital.nexamp.com for more information.)



With community solar, there is no need for installation of solar panels or other equipment, and there are no long-term contracts. Our utility provider, National Grid, will stay the same. We're hoping for a savings of up to 10% on our yearly energy costs by utilizing solar power. This energy is generated on a solar farm and sent to the utility company. We receive credits on our bill for supporting local clean energy.

Others in the greater community and county who will be using Nexamp include the Village of Schuylerville, Temple Sinai of Saratoga Springs, Saratoga Regional YMCA and Christ Episcopal Church, Ballston Spa.

Many thanks to the Property Committee and Consistory for helping the church in its "green" mission to utilize renewable energy resources.

THE LORD'S PRAYER

(8TH in a series of articles)
"But deliver us from evil"

In this series we now arrive at the last of the seven petitions. The King James translation and many others simply record the general term evil. Many others express a more specific term, "the Evil One." As the last article indicated "there is no life without temptation." Temptation is inescapable. Since, in our humanity, we are frail, it is clear that we cannot deal with temptation by ourselves, hence we need to be delivered from the evil that induces the temptations. William Barclay tells us that "the aim of the Evil One is, by any means, to cause a break between man and God." Martin Luther said, "We cannot help being exposed to the assaults, but we pray that we may not fall or perish under them."

Matthew Henry, an English theologian of the 17th century, invites us to consider in specific terms what evil looks like. Henry speaks of the evil thing; that person or force which attacks goodness, and which invites us to sin. He speaks of "the evil of the world" which may be what the hymn writer John Bode referred to as "the sights that dazzle, the tempting sounds I hear." Matthew Henry addresses the "corruption that is in the world through lust," "the sting of death, which is sin," and that which emanates "from our own evil thoughts."

Can we resist temptation? Can we, in the present life, be "delivered from evil?" Among many examples found in Scripture, we have that of Job. It is likely that Job is the extreme example of suffering. It is likely that Job was more tempted, both overtly and in subtle fashion, than any other human being. Yet we read his words in the 27th chapter of Job, "As long as I have life within me, the breath of God in my nostrils, my lips will not speak wickedness, and my tongue will utter no deceit."

Obviously, since we are weak, we need help if we are able to be delivered from evil. We note, in Job's declaration, the presence of God's Spirit. The apostle James admonishes us, "Submit yourselves to God. Resist the devil, and he will flee from you."(4:7) In the Son of God, we have assurance of help. "Because he himself (Jesus) suffered when he was tempted, he is able to help those who are being tempted." (Hebrews 2: 18) Finally, the testimony of Timothy in his 2nd letter (4:18) "The Lord will rescue me from every evil attack and will bring me safely to his heavenly kingdom. To him be glory for ever and ever. Amen."
