From the Pastor...

It is good to **give thanks** to the Lord... to declare your steadfast love in the morning, and your faithfulness by night. (from Psalm 92:1-2)

Dear Members and Friends of Old Saratoga,

Greetings in the Grace of God and the Peace of Christ!

November is a special month for giving thanks. Many people are making plans to gather with family or friends for the celebration of **Thanksgiving Day** on Thursday, November 28. The church will have its annual **Thanksgiving Service** on Sunday, November 24!

"It is good", as the Psalmist says, "to give thanks to the Lord." By doing so, we're reminded that God is the Source and Giver of life and all things—that the universe is overflowing with blessing and abundance—from the breath-taking beauty of a crimson maple tree in autumn to the life-giving love of people in our lives who care.

The Psalmist says further that giving thanks to God is a good framework for the start and close of every day of our lives. This is especially important in the difficult times of life when bad things happen and our days can feel more filled with anxiety than with thank- fulness.

So we ask, What is the "good" in giving thanks to God every day?

I can think of at least three reasons—and you may have more!

First, giving thanks to God—or "counting" one's blessings as some speak of it, awakens our senses and our hearts to really seeing and appreciating what's around us--and that God is the center of all that supports our lives and gives us joy.

Second, giving thanks helps bring perspective to all that happens to us—the good and the not-so-good. When scripture says, "be thankful in all circumstances, for this is the will of God in Christ Jesus for you" (I Thess. 5:18), we take this to mean that it's not only God's will, but to our benefit to be open to the meaning of things that happen to us. Sometimes what we consider to be the worst possible thing that could happen, can be a blessing in disguise or an opportunity to grow in strength or deepen our faith.

Third, giving thanks to God makes us mindful of the needs of others. Some of you may remember times when you had to work at being thankful for what you did have in a time of being without. Such experience makes the heart more sensitive to people who are hungry, homeless, or alone. Each time we give thanks to God, it helps us remember that ALL we have comes as a gift from the bounty of God's Goodness and Love to be **shared!**

May you and your family and friends have a **Blessed Thanksgiving**—and may this day and every day be days to "give thanks to the Lord!"

UPDATE ON DOUGHNUT SALES



HYMNS OF OUR FAITH

"Sing to the Lord, you saints of his; praise his holy name." Psalm 30: 4

"Marvelous grace of our living Lord, grace that exceed our sin and guilt, Yonder on Calvary's mount outpoured, there where the blood of the Lamb was spilt. Grace, grace God's grace, grace that will pardon and cleanse within; Grace, grace, God's grace, grace that is greater than all our sin."

Julia H. Johnson wrote poetry as did her grandmother and mother before her. Her father was a Presbyterian pastor. In addition to authoring over 500 hymns, Julia worked as a Sunday school Superintendent and teacher for over forty years, and served as president of the Presbyterian Mission Society.

We don't know of any single event that became the impetus for writing the poem that became a hymn. But, without a doubt, Julia was well versed in scripture, reflecting Paul's letter to the Romans (ch.5) "...since we are justified by faith, we have peace with God through our lord Jesus Christ, through whom we have obtained access to the grace in which we stand..."

Throughout humankind's history we have been trying to earn God's grace through our labors and our "good works." Margit Ernst-Habib, a German theologian, wrote, "We cannot redeem ourselves- and we do not have to!.. We cannot do enough to earn God's grace." She reflects the words of Peter that we are redeemed "not with perishable things such as silver and gold...but with the precious blood of Christ." Grace is the "free and unmerited favor of God." Our good works are not unimportant, but are an expression of gratitude for the gift of God's grace.

The last verse leaves us with a question:

"Marvelous, infinite, matchless grace, freely
bestowed on all who believe:

You who are longing to see God's face, will you this
moment God's grace receive?"

TURNING POINT REFORMED CHURCHES FELLOWSHIP TEAM REPORT

For two years now, since Old Saratoga, Bacon Hill and Fort Miller Reformed Churches came together as the "Turning Point Reformed Churches" to participate in the Albany Synod Fellowship Program, along with our "fellow" in ministry, Pastor Jenn Legg, we have been having regular meetings.

Two representatives from each of the three churches and the pastors attend these meetings which used to be monthly, but are now quarterly. We thank **Anne Mitchell** and **Susanna Combs**, who are currently representing Old Saratoga. At a recent meeting in October, it was decided that the Turning Point Churches would hold three joint worship services on Sundays following holidays when attendance is typically lower at all three churches. Here is the schedule:

The committee talked about the success of the Community Picnic on Sept. 9, and the plan to do it again next year; reports on Room For All were shared; an update was given on the Women's Retreat to be held Oct. 25-27 at Camp Fowler for all three churches; the possibility was raised of having another consistory leadership retreat in 2020; and developing a Turning Point Churches website or Facebook page that would have a calendar of events for the three churches.

THE LORD'S PRAYER



Over a series of eight prior articles we have focused on individual sections of the Lord's Prayer. We learned that it is a prayer that Jesus taught in response to one of his disciple's request, "Lord, teach us to pray." (Luke 11:1) We find that the full text of the prayer, recorded by Matthew (6: 9-13) and in an abbreviated form, with some difference in wording, in Luke 11: 2-4. I would encourage the reader to look at Jesus' advice about prayer, which precedes Matthew's account (6:5-8) Here Jesus addresses our attitude while in prayer, suggests where we should pray, and warns against simply: "babbling like pagans" (vain repetitions.) I trust that the reader will find extreme comfort in the words which close out verse 8: "for your father knows what you need before you ask him."

In looking at the Lord's Prayer, we were reminded that it is a universal and communal prayer, and so we do not say "my Father," but rather "Our Father." We acknowledge God's sovereignty and our dependence upon his grace. We discover that the prayer contains seven petitions: the first three are centered on God, and the last four are about our human needs, both physical and spiritual. We honor and glorify God's name, seek the coming of God's kingdom, as we pray that we may be ruled by God's Word and Spirit, and confess our need for obedience to God's will. As we petition the Father concerning our human needs, we pray for provision of what we need physically for each day; plead for forgiveness of our debts and the grace to forgive others; ask for deliverance from the time of trial, and rescue from the evil one. We close the prayer on a note of praise to God, "...because, as our all-powerful king, you are both willing and able to give us all that is good; and because your holy name, and not we ourselves, should receive all the praise, forever. Amen" (Heidelberg Catechism answer to question 128)

As we offer the Lord's Prayer each Sunday, it is vital that we move beyond ritualistic recitation to a heart and soul-felt understanding of this all-inclusive prayer. To grasp its full meaning, it is helpful for us to consider other expressions of this prayer as offered by saints of God over many centuries.

Contemporary German theologian, Margit Ernst-Habib, commenting on the Lord's Prayer as thankfulness, had this to say: "God requires us to pray, and prayer is not just one, but the most important part of thankfulness...Prayer is, first and foremost, thankful response to God's grace, because in prayer we give thanks for all God has done for us in Christ, and we continually ask for the gift of grace. In doing so, we, as those who have been delivered by God, surrender ourselves completely to this Deliverer, trusting in God's promises and not ourselves." 1

To God be the glory. Amen
