Guest Editorial

"For I know the plans I have for you, declares the Lord, plans to prosper you and not to harm you, plans to give you hope and a future." Jeremiah 29: 11

These words from Jeremiah are a promise from God that we need to claim. We need to claim it both for our church, and for our individual lives. It is a promise that if claimed and sought after can help us in these difficult times. It is a promise that addresses our present lack of a pastor, the needs of those who are stressed by the present pandemic, the needs of those suffering from illness or injury, the needs of those who seek employment and a means of supporting themselves and their families

The story behind God's words to Jeremiah is this: Jeremiah knew about tough times. He was God's chosen messenger to a rebellious nation. He warns of coming disaster unless the people repent of their wrongdoings. Jeremiah's warnings go unheeded. Jeremiah lives through the initial siege of Jerusalem by the Babylonians and gives advice about the policies the nation should adopt in the aftermath.

Despite the gloomy outlook that Jeremiah had presented, his message contains important words of hope. Although it appears that the nation is about to fall, God tells Jeremiah to buy a plot of farmland. In short, although the nation would suffer, God promises to restore them. The message of Jeremiah 29:11 is given to surviving elders among the exiles in Babylon; people who had remained faithful to God. The plan for them is to "build houses and settle down; plant gardens and eat what they produce. Marry and have sons and daughters...." And in due time bring them back to their homeland.

I am in no way intimating that our present adversities are because we lack faithfulness to God. Our adversities are of a different sort. But our loving God desires that none should perish. Hence, he has plans for Old Saratoga Reformed Church, and for each of us as individuals. We may not be able to comprehend the plan at this time, but God wants us to prosper, to experience hope, and to find a future of service for God's kingdom in this place.

We would do well to follow the advice of the Apostle Paul to the church in Corinth. "My dear brothers and sisters, stand firm. Let nothing move you. Always give yourselves fully to the work of the Lord, because you know that your labor is not in vain." (1 Corinthians 15: 58 NIV)

HYMNS OF OUR FAITH

"Sing to the Lord, ye saints of God." Psalm 30: 4 "Savior Again to Your Dear Name We Raise" "Savior, again to your dear name we raise

With one accord our parting hymn of praise; We give you thanks before our worship cease, And now departing wait your word of peace."

A prayer for peace is evident in each verse of this hymn, possibly inspired by John 14: 27, where Jesus said to his disciples, "Peace I leave with you, my peace I give you."

This hymn appears to be meant for the closing of worship (before our worship cease) but then expands as a prayer for peace while traveling home, through the coming night, and through the rest of our lives. The use of these words should not be limited, I believe, to the close of worship, but might be part of our daily devotional practice.

The author of the poem is John Ellerton who lived in mid 19th century England. He was an Anglican pastor, chaplain, teacher, hymnologist, and translator. Nearly every one of his 50 hymns are in common use. Expression of the peace that God gives was an oft used theme in Ellerton's poems and his plea for "peace in our time" is as fresh and necessary today as it was in Ellerton's time.

"Grant us your peace throughout our earthly life; Comfort in sorrow, courage in the strife; Then, when your voice shall make our conflict cease, Call us, O Lord, to your eternal peace."
