Musings In the Interim

The Big One & The Little One

"So, what do we do?" is the question every interim ministry gets to at about this stage. Each congregation, those with easily identifiable problems like the one where money was stolen, and those with harder challenges like the one where the minister had committed suicide, all needed to have some positive action introduced to move forward. I have now been with you all at OSRC for a few months, made a good number of visits and had some more helpful conversations, and now it is time to do something.

OSRC is a congregation in transition, which is healthy, - not a congregation in crisis, which isn't. So OSRC does not need major transfusions nor huge re-building as many of my other assignments have. OSRC needs rather to spend some interim time focusing on how we are doing with "majoring in the majors" rather than majoring in the minors. So we are going to spend the Fall working on two topics, a big one and a little one.

The big topic is God & Worship. The decline of Christianity in the West has many causes and means many things, but it is rooted in a single reality - as individuals, we no longer talk with one another about our current, real-time, experience of God - and as a culture, we no longer have a common way of gathering to speak with God together, expecting and noticing God's presence and response. Individuals still have faith, but we lack common language for sharing it. Congregations still hold gatherings called Worship, but the gatherings are all different and the objective presence of God is not transparent to either those present or those outside.

The little topic is the coming minister. In the old days (whenever that was for you) we all knew what a minister was like and what a minister was intended to do. The *Letter of Call* for a Minister still has words in it. But ask yourself, "Do these words help me and the others in the congregation, all of us, understand what a minister should do each day after breakfast?"

to be our pastor and teacher; to preach the Word of God in truth and faithfulness; to administer the holy sacraments agreeably to the institution of Christ; to edify the congregation, and especially the youth by catechetical instruction and by explaining the essential truths of the Holy Scriptures; to maintain Christian discipline; and to fulfill as a faithful servant of Jesus Christ the whole work of the gospel ministry in conformity with the Word of God and the Constitution of the Reformed Church in America

On four Sundays during the Fall, we are going to have "Coffee Hour Conversations". For an hour after worship, we will gather to talk about these two topics. The format will be a 10 minute presentation to focus the conversation followed by 30 minutes or so of guided conversation in which it will be important for as many as possible to speak what they feel and think. The goal is not to reach conclusions, as this is much too short a time frame. The goal is to begin a common conversation among OSRC folk that can continue with the new minister. Our four will be:

HYMN OF THE MONTH

Sing to the Lord, you saints of his; praise his holy name.

Psalm 30: 4

"More about Jesus would I know, More of His grace to others show, More of His saving fullness see, More of his love who died for me."

The author of this poem, Eliza Edmunds Hewitt, (1851-1920) was a Philadelphia schoolteacher. A spinal injury cut short her employment in the school system but did not stifle the desires of the teacher she aspired to be. During her convalescence, in a body cast, Eliza studied English literature and began writing poems for children's Sunday School classes. In time, Eliza Hewitt went on to teach Sunday School and became Superintendent of the primary department of Calvary Presbyterian Church.

A prolific writer, Hewitt wrote thousands of poems, many of which became hymns when put to music. "More About Jesus", "When We All Get to Heaven" and "Sunshine in My Soul" are among the more notable. Many of the prominent hymn composers of her day adapted Eliza's poems to music. During her adult years, Hewitt became friends with Fanny Crosby. The two spent many days together talking about hymns and encouraging each other.

The desire to know more about Jesus reflects any number of Biblical texts. The Apostle Paul speaks of his desire "to know Christ and the power of his resurrection" (Phil.3:10) He commends to us "the word of God's grace which is able to build us up." (Acts 20: 32) and speaks of the "immeasurable riches of God's grace in kindness toward us in Christ Jesus." (Eph. 2:7)

We come to know more about Jesus in a variety of ways: through the reading of God's Word, Bible study, the preaching of the Word and celebration of the sacraments, the hymns that we sing, and even through the lives of others as we witness the Savior's love reflected in their work for God's kingdom.

PROPERTY

The Property Committee has not met much of late, as the demolition process has been taking place in the parsonage. The kitchen and bathroom are being rewired and prepared for the sheetrock. The new cabinets were delivered and will be installed soon. Then the counters can be measured for the new stone top. The bathroom will have radiant heat in the floor and a walk-in shower. Bathroom fixtures were delivered on 8/27, and the "push" will be on to get them installed for Pastor Rett when he returns.

Chris Garney has been keeping careful records of the expenses for the renovation/repair. She reports that to date we have spent \$32,200.62

This money has come from the 2012 bequest of Richard Bauer, who designated his gift to be used for Capital Improvements. We also were able to sell the old bricks from the "chimney to nowhere" which was torn out to improve access to the kitchen and upstairs bathroom.

Additionally, the Memorial Money, which was donated in memory of Anna Bierma, was designated by her family to help with the

The church office received an email from the RCA asking congregations to consider supporting the country of Haiti with donations, after it suffered the effects of an earthquake and a hurricane. The Deacons decided to give the congregation the opportunity to help by asking people to either send a check to be made out to the church and earmarked for Haiti, or to ask worshipers to add their donations to their regular check, earmarked with the <u>amount for "Haiti"</u> clearly designated.

All contributions should be in by Sept. 5. At that time, Chris Garney will send a check for the total donations to the RCA Finance Dept. where they will send it to be used by a legitimate relief group.

SUMMER APPEAL UPDATE



The Summer Appeal has brought in a total of \$2,215 for our General Fund. This fund is what is used to pay the regular expenses of the church: salaries, electric bills, insurance payments, heating expenses, etc. and is dependent on the consistent giving of the members of the church, even when they are not able to attend.
