Musings in the Interim

HOW'S BY YOU?

November 2021

In the midst of Hallowe'en, we remember that it is also the anniversary of the Reformation, which formed the Reformed Church grounded in the teachings of John Calvin. Ask a Calvinist, "How are you?" and you can expect to hear "Totally depraved". For those of you who do not read the tomes of the Reformation as devotional literature, the first of five doctrinal points in The Canons of the Synod of Dordrecht, 1619 is the one that deals with the doctrine of Total Depravity, explaining that all of life is infused with sin. Just for fun, I bring up "Grim John" in sermons now and again to see if Calvinism has much life or interest among people today.

Up front, it appears there are not many Calvinists among us. A Gallup poll, conducted before the 2016 election started moving all the polls, indicated that 55% of us were satisfied with "the way things are going in the United States at this time". And even more unCalvinistically, 83% were satisfied with the way things are going in their personal lives.

I wonder who made up that 83%. I suspect that the 53% of young Black families with children who were living below the poverty level in 2014 were not among them. I hunch that the baby of a single Black mother under 25 who now has a 9 out of 10 chance of being poor for life is also not included. On the fourth Thursday of this month, struggling families will be thankful for the little they do have. Will the 83%? Or will their feelings be more a sort of jaded relief at not being more stressed out - with a "thankful" label tenuously stuck on? I would like to pray that there are not any Christians included in the satisfied 83% but of course the numbers mean that there are. About 50% of the US population still claim Christianity so at least 30+% of them must be among the satisfied.

Those numbers illustrate two ways modern Christians are bedeviled. First, that we are more formed by our culture than our faith. No Christian would deliberately refuse to help another person whose need was plain and obvious. That we feel satisfied with life and do so refuse on grounds of taxes, self-determination, social class, and limited perspective is due to our being products of our culture rather than products of the Holy Spirit. Secondly, we are more concerned with the opinion of our friends than with God's. We would sooner stifle feelings and opinions than embarrass ourselves by contradicting the prevailing norm.

Being people of our age is a problem all humans share. No one in any age since Eden has escaped the isolation of being alone in a world we did not make. God invites us, however, to be part of the Triune Conversation in the world which God has made and is making. Modern media pays God no attention at all. Yet God's people know God's activity as tangible and real. In that most real world, all will finally be whole and there will be neither crying nor pain. God joined our world in Christ just to issue that invitation. And the invitation is renewed and re-issued each Lord's Day at Old Saratoga Reformed Church. I hope to see you in your regular place to both receive the invitation and respond.

CHURCH LIFE

SEARCH COMMITTEE

The Search Committee met for the first time on Sunday, Oct. 24. **Chris Garney** has agreed to chair the committee. Members will be working on developing a church profile, based on an email from the Reformed Church in America. The Office of Ministry Services provides information to ordained ministers who are seeking a call, and to churches who are seeking ordained ministers. It does not recommend any particular candidate or church, but instead serves as a resource to both. The next meeting will be **Sunday, Nov. 7**, following worship.

OUR MISSIONS - November

Deacons' Fund-Shelters of Saratoga

The Shelters of Saratoga gives "shelter," because every individual deserves the right to the most basic needs – food, clothing, and shelter. They do this by providing a safe and secure atmosphere. They give "opportunity to change lives due to homelessness." They give "support" to rebuild lives through advocacy, rehabilitation and transitioning programs.

Quarterly Mission – The Giving Circle

Its purpose is to shape better lives by building and teaching sustainable solutions in education, health, farming and economic selfempowerment. It's an all-volunteer, non- profit organization, originally founded in response to Hurricanes Katrina and Rita, but has since expanded to work with underserved families in Saratoga County, the Code Blue homeless shelter, and support for the Koi Koi House orphanage in Africa.

GENERAL SYNOD 2021

The General Synod of the RCA met in Tucson, Arizona October 14-19. For the past twenty years, as the surrounding culture has become more accepting of variations in human sexuality, a significant number of ministers and congregations of the RCA have wanted the denomination to take a definitive stand that would prevent any RCA entity from accepting or accommodating the cultural changes. That discussion/disagreement, with recommendations, was presented in the Vision 2020 Report, which was discussed and acted upon at this Synod.

All the details, for those who wish to dig deeper, are available at <u>www.rca.org</u>. The short story is that no changes were made to the Church Order, the rules by which the RCA operates. Instead, affirmation of our Global Mission program remaining RCA controlled, rather than distributed among both remaining and leaving congregations, was approved. Also, several recommendations to allow ministers and congregations to more easily leave the denomination, were approved. A number of both ministers and congregations, primarily in the far West and Indiana, have left already and some more are expected to do so in the near future. In addition, a fifteen person task force will be appointed to consider specific changes that have been suggested, to report at Synod 2024.

Synod 2021 was a waypoint for affirming the decisiveness of personal relationships in cultural change. Some will leave the church, but OSRC will continue to live with the need to discover new ways to be Church in a changed culture. The actions of Synod 2021 neither change nor prescribe the ways OSRC works at that task. **Rett Zabriskie**

HYMNS OF OUR FAITH

"Sing to the Lord, you saints of his; praise his holy name." (Psalm 30:4) "We are called to be God's people, showing by our lives his grace, One in heart and one in spirit, sign of hope for all the race. Let us show how he has changed us, and remade us as his own, Let us share our life together as we shall around the throne."

This contemporary hymn takes us well beyond the comfort of Sunday morning worships into our everyday lives, where we are called into ministry for the sake of God's kingdom. All believers in Christ are called to spread the "Good News" to a world that needs the knowledge of God's grace.

In verse three we see application of the hymn to current national and world-wide issues. The Baptist hymnwriter, Thomas A. Jackson, implores us to "speak for the truth and right," "stand firm for godly justice," and bring evil things to light," so that "the world may know the blessing of doing God's will."

Matthew 20:27 reminds us that the "Son of Man (Jesus) came not to be served but to serve, and to give his life as a ransom for many." In Ephesians 4: 1 the Apostle Paul begs us to "lead a life worthy of our calling..." As imitators of Christ, we are to boldly identify with the master and accept our calling as servants and prophets.
