**Greetings Friends!** 



This letter is a follow-up to my sermon on Sunday, January 16<sup>th</sup> and an opportunity for you to help. The Epistle text that Sunday was from Paul's letter to the Corinthians assuring them that every one of them had been given gifts by the Holy Spirit that would allow them to serve God and each other. The same is true for us today. The Holy Spirit continues to plant seeds that empower us to serve.

One big need at our church right now is help with worship services. We have been blessed with many members who have shared their beliefs as they led worship. I am hoping there are others who are open to the idea of taking small steps to join that group. If you are interested in preaching, I am happy to put you on the schedule, but I think for many people that may be an overwhelming thought. I do, however, believe that there are those of you out there who have this seed planted and are waiting for someone to help nurture it to bloom, so I have come up with the idea of doing cooperative worship on the last Sunday of the month.

For January, we had several people, both those who worship with us in person and those who join our services online, who shared one of their favorite hymns and told briefly why that hymn was meaningful to them. For February, we will be having a few people briefly share their thoughts on why it is important to them to be part of a congregation. We already have 2 volunteers but need at least 2 or 3 more. In March, I would like to ask people to share their favorite Bible passages and what those words mean to them. Later in the Spring, we can do another service of favorite hymns or look at other topics such as why worship is important to you, how prayer is important in your life, or how music enhances worship for you. I am open to other ideas for topics that you may think would be beneficial for us to delve into.

As I explained in my sermon, this isn't just about helping me to fill in the worship schedule. It is, even more importantly, an opportunity to help others nurture and develop the gifts we have been given. Dick Behrens and I are eager to help and support you as you try new things. If you can't be at church in person and are willing to share, someone will read your statements.

#### Feb. Deacons' Fund- Caring and Sharing

The Caring and Sharing Fund of Schuylerville Central School helps district children and families throughout the year when needs arise. The fund is especially active at Christmas time, when it gives gifts to children who otherwise might not receive any. Old Saratoga's Pam Driscoll is one of the codirectors of this mission. Your check, made out to OSRC and earmarked Caring and Sharing, will help to support this program. 1<sup>st</sup> Quarter Mission – Drilling For Hope Drilling For Hope was started in 2005 by Karen Flewelling. Since Karen pays for her own travel, lodging and food expenses, 100% of donations go to people and well drilling endeavors. Through the generosity of donors, Drilling For Hope provides water wells and farm animals to communities around the world in need of clean water. Food, medicine and school supplies are also donated, along with the sponsoring of children who would otherwise not receive an education.

#### HYMNS OF OUR FAITH

"Sing to the Lord, you saints of his; praise his holy name." (Psalm 30:4) "Ye Servants of God, Your Master Proclaim" "Ye servants of God, your master proclaim, And publish abroad his wonderful name. The name all-victorious of Jesus extol, his kingdom is glorious, he rules over all."

"Ye Servants of God" is among the nearly 10,000 hymns written by the great poet and preacher Charles Wesley. It was composed around the year 1744, a time of political and religious turmoil in Britain. The newly formed Methodist societies held revival meetings outside of church buildings, particularly in open fields, attracting and welcoming thousands of listeners. Members of the Methodist society were at time arrested for "disturbing the peace."

While in many churches only the Psalms were sung, the Methodists were known, and at times mocked, for their exuberant singing of Charles' hymns. His hymns contained doctrinal statements about God's love, personal accountability to God, and the way that God works in our lives through the Holy Spirit. "Ye Servants of God" is a hymn is a hymn of praise and a call to service. It sings of the majesty of God, the need to honor the Son, and the presence

of the Holy Spirit. It reveals the cosmic scope of Christ's kingdom. The "servants of God" mentioned in the first verse consists not only of those who are ordained, but all believers in Christ.

"Then let us adore and give him his right, All glory and power, all wisdom and might. All honor and blessing, with angels above, And thanks never ceasing, and infinite love." Dick Behrens

#### **2021 FINANCIAL UPDATE**

Thank you to everyone who supported the ministry of Old Saratoga during 2021. Our budget predictions were very close to what we actually received and spent. We ended the year with all our bills and mission fund donations paid, and got through the year without having to cash in any investment funds to cover our bills. Mission donations were down in some categories but up in others, and our Deacons continue to make thoughtful, prayerful decisions about which organizations we support. These donations are fully funded by specially marked gifts (not general donations or fundraisers) and our bottle and can recycling program. We could use more volunteers to help with recycling. Our PPP loan was forgiven by the Federal Government and we found creative ways to hold fundraisers during the pandemic that brought in more income than anticipated. Even without an official Stewardship Program we received a donation to cover the cost of the fire alarm system monitoring. While our total expenses were very close to what we had predicted, there were some areas with higher expenses, due to expensive maintenance repairs to the furnace and lift. We also had increased costs for dues and fees and worship materials, as we invested in the technology to provide worship services online. We cashed in an additional \$45,600 to begin renovating the parsonage, which we expect to complete this year, and remain grateful for the endowment which provides the funding for capital improvement projects. We pray that God will continue to bless our ministry as we search for a new pastor. We remain grateful for your support through your prayers, gifts, time and talents. Chris Garney
