PASTOR'S PONDER

As I type this, it is the day after Halloween—November 1st, and it's snow-flurrying outside! Last night I got the usual flood of Trick-or-Treaters coming to the parsonage door, and met them with a bowl of candies and two little hysterically barking dogs, who kept me alert to respond to each small person's venture up those imposing stairs as smiling, proud moms and dads looked on from below. To a child, in return for their candy I

received a "Thank you!", and to my greeting of "Happy Halloween!", a similar wishing of happiness for the rest of the evening. There were only a couple of Anna/Elsas this year (the sisters from "Frozen")—a big shift from the past ten years. Instead, the popular costume for young girls of every age was Wednesday, the darkly macabre daughter from "The Adams Family". The little cowboys and bigger hobos from my youth were nowhere in sight, replaced by impressive large costume-constructions of dinosaurs or monsters or Hulk-ish characters. I'm not sure what all of that says about contemporary society, but I miss the fairies and princesses, the cowboys and astronauts and little furry-hooded farm animals who used to come in droves to the door for candy. I'm not sure what measure can be taken from that about society or parenting styles or the media children are exposed to nowadays, but it makes me feel both nostalgic and a bit sad somehow. It seems to be in keeping with the world news in general, and all of that turns my heart and mind to prayer... for all of us.

I recently reviewed an old sermon that contains the following section—

"The human (biblical) cycle is:

- The people sin
- God punishes them
- The people repent
- God delivers/saves them and life is GOOD and so back to the first bullet.

Jesus (Easter) breaks the cycle; that is, God-self breaks the cycle! IF we participate."

My prayer for this month of Thanksgiving-- which leads us into a month of Advent preparation to celebrate the gift of Jesus once again—my prayer is that somehow, by God's grace, the world can desist in destruction and violence against other earthlings (a term I'll explain in a moment), and rejoice in the joy of peace. So... instead of seeing snow flurries as the beginning of the end of Autumn, I ask you to join me in seeing them instead as the beginning of a new beginning, where sin and sadness are washed away, akin to the brightness of newly fallen snow, and all the world rejoices with thanksgiving!

Hymns of Our Faith

"Sing to the Lord, you saints of his; praise his holy name." (Psalm 30:4)

We give thee but thine own, whate'er the gift may be: All that we have is thine alone, a trust, O Lord, from thee.

In the liturgy for a recent a recent Sunday (Matthew 22:15-22), Jesus was asked, "Is it lawful to pay taxes to the emperor or not?" Jesus's reply confounded the Pharisees and Herodians, spoiling their trap, saying, "Give to the emperor the things that are the emperor's and to God the things that are God's."

One interpretation of Jesus's answer is that we are to be good citizens and pay our taxes, since "the authorities that exist are instituted by God." (Romans 13:1). But, our allegiance must be to God, the creator and giver of all that is good.

An English clergyman of the 19th century, Willam Walsham How, captures the essence of this interpretation in his 1858 hymn, "We Give Thee but Thine Own" since "all that we have is thine alone, a trust, O Lord from thee."

Bishop How was called "the poor man's bishop", since he was known for his work among the destitute in the London slums and among factory workers in west Yorkshire. This helps our understanding of his poetry when we read the verse that says, "To comfort and to bless, to find a balm for woe, to tend the lone and fatherless is angel's work below."

How's compositions are characterized as "simple, unadorned, but enthusiastically practical hymns". Among his other contributions are, "O Jesu, Thou art Standing", "For all the Saints who from their Labors Rest", and "O Word of God Incarnate". Nearly sixty of How's hymns are in common use today—three published in our red hymnal.

"And we believe thy word, though dim our faith may be; What-e'er for thine we do, O Lord, we do it unto thee."



We Live Our Faith: Local Recycling Opportunities that Help the Earth and Others



Pull Tabs

- 1. Bring pull tabs from cans to church. There is a container in the front entryway.
- 2. The tabs are sent to the Shriner's Hospital. They are sold to a recycling company.
- 3. The Shriners use the money to support the pediatric healthcare system for orthopedic, spine, burn and other specialty care for children.

Clothing & Textiles

- 1. Bring clothes, shoes, linens, purses, belts, and stuffed animals to a Blue Box. There are Blue Boxes in the parking lots at Byron's (Broad St.) and Hearthstone Veterinary Clinic (Route 29).
- 2. The items are sold to a recycling company. The items that are still good go to people who need them at a low cost. The other items are recycled into new materials.
- 3. The money we get from the recycling company helps our church pay its bills.

5¢ Deposit Bottles & Cans

- Bring 5¢ deposit bottles and cans to church. There is a bin for them next to the back door.
- 2. Church members take turns bringing them to Hannaford in Clynk bags which are scanned and dropped off in the recycling area. More helpers for this project would be wonderful.
- 3. The church uses the money for mission projects to help others.

Metal

- Bring metal objects to the American Legion on Clancy
 There is a huge container in the parking lot.
 - 2. The metal gets sold to a recycling company.
- 3. The American Legion uses the money to help Veterans and Boy Scouts.
