PASTOR'S PONDER

Here we are in Lent— the church season traditionally set aside for thoughtful consideration of our lives, repentance, and turning our hearts back to God—and it began on Valentine's Day this year! At first, I confess I was very dismayed by that confluence, but those

faithful folks who attended the first Lenten Ecumenical worship instead declared by their presence that Ash Wednesday trumps the secular Valentine's Day... and affirmed that in our relationships, especially our relationship with God, *every* day should be special!

Here's a Fun Fact: Did you wonder why Easter is so early this year? Easter is determined by the Sunday following the first full moon after the vernal (or spring) equinox. In 2024, the vernal equinox is on 20th March and the following full moon is on 30th March. Therefore, Easter is on the 30th of March! I wonder if any crocuses, daffodils, and tulips will be poking up by then?

And DID YOU KNOW ...

We are in Year B of the Revised Common Lectionary which means that we are reading from the Gospel of Mark, with some additions from Luke and John. The Old Testament readings are from the first five books of the Bible (the Pentateuch), and from the books of Joshua and Judges. In this cycle the Old Testament readings serve as a framework for understanding the Gospel readings.

For the past several years I've been preaching faithfully from the Revised Common Lectionary cycles, but starting this June I am planning to preach through a couple of thematic series instead. The first will be focused on biblical themes from our stunning stained glass windows. The second will be working our way through themes found in the New Testament book of James. I hope you will enjoy them as much as I am taking pleasure in the planning (already!). Then we'll finish up Year B by returning to the lectionary and Mark this fall.

Year C and the Gospel of Luke (with smatterings from John) begins on the first Sunday of Advent, December 1st, this year—only three days after Thanksgiving!

For now, I encourage you to make an effort to attend one or more of our Ecumenical Lenten Wednesday Night services (schedule found elsewhere in this newsletter). It is one of the joys of being a pastor here in Schuylerville to be able to participate in such an active and mutually supportive group of clergy, lay people, and congregations during this holy season. I love visiting our neighbors' churches, listening to others' preaching, and to share bountifully in the joy of communal singing. I highly recommend it for inspiration, spiritual focus, renewal, and Christian fellowship.

Hymns of Our Faith


"Christ is the World's Light"

"Christ is the world's light, Christ and none other; Born in our darkness, he became our brother. If we have seen him, we have seen the Father Glory to God on high."

This contemporary hymn (1963) was the creation of English clergyman Fred Pratt Green. The poem was joined to a 300-year-old melody, Christe Sanctorum, a very singable tune.

Ordained in 1928, Pastor Green served Methodist churches throughout England for over fifty years. He authored poems and hymns during that time, but his work as a writer became prolific after retiring from the pulpit. Over two decades, Green wrote around 300 hymns and songs. His work spread across theological, denominational, and national boundaries, and gained particularly wide use in the USA. In addition to his own hymns, Green also produced translations – notably, one of Dietrich Bonhoeffer's late poems as the hymn "By Gracious Powers So Wonderfully Sheltered."

"Christ is the World's Light" introduces the worshipper to Christ as the world's light, peace, and life, and firmly dismisses any other source of true light, peace, or life. Each verse of the hymn identifies Christ's relationship to the Father, and sends a clear social gospel message concerning our relationship to others made in God's image and likeness. Themes of unity and tolerance are easily understood, and echo Jesus' command that loving and serving God sees its fulfillment in loving and serving others.

RCA Global Mission Update: Lebanon

Dear Friends,

In early December, Peter Ford and I sent you an urgent appeal for funds to provide emergency care for people in Lebanon who were fleeing the escalation of drone and missile strikes along the Israel/Lebanon border (and to provide care for those living in small villages near the border who have remained in their homes).

I'm grateful to share that RCA Global Mission has sent \$17,000 (USD) to Rev. Linda Macktaby in Lebanon, and she and her colleagues have used those funds to provide shelter, mattresses, clean water, food, medicine, diapers, and fuel for cooking and heating for 1,100 displaced people! \$10,000 was sent immediately through the Refugee Care Crisis Fund, and we've raised an additional \$7,000 through the Lebanon Displacement Relief Project.

Thank you! Your compassionate and generous gifts to the Refugee Care Crisis Fund and/or the Lebanon Displacement Relief Project have made a significant impact in providing life-saving and life-sustaining care for displaced people in Lebanon by supporting the work of Rev. Macktaby and her colleagues in Lebanon.

One day, as Rev. Macktaby was delivering supplies to one of the three main shelters housing displaced people near Beirut, she witnessed this ray of sunshine bursting through the clouds. It is a wonderful reminder that "the light shines in the darkness, and the darkness has not overcome it" (John 1:5 NRSV).

However, as the length of time that people are displaced continues to grow, the needs of those displaced continue to grow as well. Rev. Macktaby herself has reported that she is often eating one meal per day, so that she can share what little food she has with others. This is the love of Christ in action.

If you have not done so yet, will you join us in providing compassionate, Christ-like care for displaced people in Lebanon? Will you share this appeal with others, so that Rev. Macktaby can meet the needs of hundreds of other displaced people who have been referred to her for assistance?
