Pastor's Ponder



These words of Jesus spoken in Matthew 19:14, Mark 10:14, and Luke 18:16 have been coming to me lately. I learned them as a small child in Sunday School from the King James translation of the Bible, so those are the words I recall— "Suffer the little children to come unto me, and forbid them not: for of such is the kingdom of God."

I think they're repeated in all three synoptic gospels because they were important to Jesus, and so very important to God. At the moment they have special meaning to me because, three weeks on from total right knee replacement surgery, I have been treating myself like a five year old, with good success. Let me explain.

This is an involved and painful surgery, make no mistake! The first week or two after it are ROUGH, and progress thereafter steady but slow going so far (again, it's only three weeks since for me...). I have found that, as with a little child, the following is true:

I don't respond well to threats, since in the moment the outcome is meaningless to me. "Just do it or you won't heal well!" (Exercises) doesn't help at all, but "Let's just try one! Good job! Can you try another?!" distracts from the pain and discomfort, and yes, I can do another. Or two more!

An encouraging mantra such as, "Today is going to be a great day! You're going to do great!", no matter how I actually feel, keeps me going—especially when repeated to myself (often followed by, "Good job!").

Words from others like, "Quit the drama and get on with it!" make me want to quit all together. Words like, "I care about you and am sorry you're in pain, but it WILL get better, and you can get through this!" help enormously. They really do.

Sometimes a good cry and some wailing and lamenting to God and the universe are at least as therapeutic as drugs if not more so, both emotionally and physically. (Really—look it up: "Crying for long periods of time releases oxytocin and endogenous opioids, otherwise known as endorphins. These feel-good chemicals can help ease both physical and emotional pain. Once the endorphins are released, your body may go into somewhat of a numb stage. Oxytocin can give you a sense of calm or well-being.")

So I'm going to continue to treat myself, at least for a few more weeks, like a little child, and work at remembering always that to God, I AM that little child: a little child who is beloved, a little child who thrives on encouragement, a little child who hurts and can heal, a little child who is never alone in either pain or triumph.

So are you!

Hymns of Our Faith by Richard Behrens

"Sing to the Lord, you saints of his; praise his holy name. (Psalm 30:4)

Blessing and Honor and Glory"


"Blessing and honor and glory and power Wisdom and riche sand strength evermore, Offer to him who our battle has won. Whose are the kingdom, the crown, and the throne."

The poem which is the basis for this hymn was composed by Horatius Bonar, a 19th century Scottish Presbyterian churchman, poet and prodigious hymn writer. He was descended from a long line of pastors who, in aggregate, served 364 years in the Church of Scotland. Horatius was an avid Bible student who also excelled in preaching and hymn-writing. He wrote nearly 600 hymns in total, 100 of which are still in use in English speaking countries.

This month's hymn reflects a number of scriptural references speaking to God's many attributes and worthiness of our adoration. The hymn is especially suited to the Ascension story and the advent of the spread of the gospel to all the nations of the world.

The first verse, quoted above, is inspired by the Apostle John's imagery found in Revelation 5:9-14 and restated in Revelation 7:10-12. The hymn finds its title in 5:13, "...blessing and honor and glory and might forever and ever. This verse recounts Christ's victory – "who our battle has won" – over sin and the grave. The second stanza is a call for heaven and earth to "echo his praises and tell of his power" and can be associated with Psalm 148. Verse three alludes to the reciprocity between the saints on earth and the gift of love emanating from God's throne – "song and joy ascending," "love descending." Verse four echoes verse one with ascription of "glory and praise to the Lamb." "Take we the robe and the harp and the psalm" relates to that time when the saints of God will join the heavenly hosts and continually sing God's praises.

I have always been moved by Bonar's very last line, "dying in weakness and rising to reign." For me it is the sum of the Lenten, Passion, Easter, and Ascension stories. I am humbled that the Son of God would leave heaven's glory, experience the suffering and pain that we know, take the form of a servant, give up his life for us, and then triumph over evil and its consequences. It truly is the greatest story ever told.


