## *Hymns of Our Faith* Analysis and thoughts from Richard Behrens

"Sing to the Lord, you saints of his; praise his holy name. (Psalm 30:4)

"Make Me a Servant"

*"Make me a servant, humble and meek, Lord, let me lift up those who are weak; And may the prayer of my heart always be; Make me a servant, make me a servant, Make me a servant today."* 

In the 9<sup>th</sup> chapter of Mark's Gospel we read about some of Jesus' disciples having an argument over which of them was the greatest. Jesus intervened and said, "Whoever wants to be first must be last of all and servant of all."

Contemporary American composer and Christian musician Kelly Willard has captured this thought in the form of a prayer, to give us the chorus of "Make Me a Servant", combining both text and music. The simple message conveys the need to be humble and meek in our service, and to focus on lifting up those who are weak.

The writer's thoughts are consistent with Jesus' Sermon on the Mount. There Jesus speaks of the blessings of being poor in spirit, meek, and merciful. The message of Willard's chorus also reflects the teachings found in the Apostle Paul's letter to the Philippians, where he speaks of Jesus' incarnation. We read that the Son of God emptied himself, taking the form of a servant; humbled himself, and was obedient to God's will.

Willard's apparent intent is that we make these words a daily prayer, humbling ourselves, and freely offering ourselves for Christian service as servants.

# October Giving

#### Mission of the 4th Quarter: The Giving Circle

The Giving Circle is an all-volunteer nonprofit organization focused on seeking out communities and individuals in need and connecting them with resources to help. The organization was founded in Saratoga Springs in 2005 by Jefferson Award honoree Mark Bertrand. The organization was initially formed in response to the damage caused by Hurricane Katrina and Hurricane Rita, and volunteers worked to help rebuild homes in southern Mississippi. Since then, they have expanded their efforts to the serve the Capital District, Uganda and Ukraine. Locally, they partner with nonprofit organizations to provide assistance to those in need such as helping the homeless, building wheelchair ramps, repairing homes, providing holiday assistance, etc. The Giving Circle Africa works on projects such as building schools, a health clinic, a savings and microloan bank, farming, and more in Uganda.

#### October Deacon's Mission: Schuyler Hose Company

The Schuylerville Fire Department was organized on August 15<sup>th</sup>, 1836 as a village fire department, then reorganized as Schuyler Hose Company on November 16<sup>th</sup>, 1953, and incorporated in 1973. Their protection area covers approximately 20 square miles, which includes the Village of Schuylerville and portions of the Towns of Saratoga, Northumberland, Easton, and Greenwich.

## A New Era of Camp Fowler

Fowler Friends and Family,

As many of you may have heard, after an incredible 38 years, Kent Busman, is retiring at the end of 2025. Kent has provided an incredible vision and leadership during his time here, mentoring thousands of young adults and youth over the years, and will surely be missed! The continuity, thoughtfulness, intentionality, and quality of Uncle Kent's presence at Fowler have laid an incredible foundation for the next generation of campers and community to experience the simplicity of God's presence in an ever-changing world.

The Fowler Board of Trustees (FBoT) has renewed its commitment to Fowler's mission and vision. Planning has been underway for this transition for the last 9 years. We concluded a master planning process back in 2017 with consultants keenly familiar with Fowler, its mission, and operations specifically to plan a smooth transition. A fellow was hired for a multi-year contract this year and will be present with the incoming Executive Director. Fowler continues to have an incredible team with some solid tenure in Harv, Lauren, Jen, and Josey who are amazing and have everything moving in the right direction!

A Transition Team has been working diligently for the last 8 months doing the preliminary legwork to review and vet candidates for our next Executive Director. They have a communication plan in place for the process to keep the Fowler Family apprised as appropriate, have now finished the job description, and conducted well over 100 interviews with volunteers, summer staff, year-round staff, and others to ensure insights from a vast range of stakeholders are considered in the process. They are also charged with planning the onboarding process to ensure our next director has all the resources needed and can quickly get up to speed with the operation.

Many folks have asked what they can do to support Fowler in the meantime. There are four ways you can help support your camp as we continue the process:

- 1. Pray for the FBoT and Transition Team for discernment
- 2. Pray for the existing staff for patience and peace as they await a change in leadership
- 3. Share the job description with your contacts
- 4. Donate your time, talents, and funds whatever you're able, particularly when the new Executive Director starts, it will be important for them to be able to build relationships with people when hired and will need the support of time and talents to continue Fowler's mission.

Thank you for all you each do for Christ's ministry at Fowler! As the Transition Team continues its work, there will be quarterly updates to keep stakeholders informed of the progress.

## ANNUAL MEETING 2024

#### This year's annual meeting is to be held on November $17^{\text{TH}}$ .

Volunteer sheets and Consistory nomination forms will be going out soon. As a reminder, here are the current Consistory terms for 2024.

Each consistory member is able to serve 3 consecutive 2-year terms, with a required 2-year break after the maximum number of consecutive terms have been served.

**Deacon Bruce Guerineau:** Term 2, Year 2 – eligible for nomination in 2025 for a 3<sup>rd</sup> term. **Deacon Cindy Brockman:** Term 2, Year 2 – eligible for nomination in 2025 for a 3<sup>rd</sup> term. **Deacon Bridget Critelli:** Term 2, Year 1 – serving second year of term in 2025.

**Elder Mark Booth:** Term 2 Year 2 – eligible for nomination in 2025 for a 3<sup>rd</sup> term. **Elder Anne Mitchell:** Term 1, Year 1 – serving second year of term in 2025. **Elder Patrick Woomer:** completes 1-year interim term, leaving an open full term to fill.

Paula Sheely is on the required break, and is ineligible for nomination until 2025.

#### At this meeting, we will need to elect 2 deacons and 2 elders.

#### THE GOVERNANCE OF THE CHURCH ACCORDING TO OUR BOOK OF CHURCH ORDER

The Reformed Church in America (RCA) is part of the Reformed tradition in the worldwide Church of Jesus Christ. The RCA has its immediate source in the Reformed Church in the Netherlands and other European countries. These churches grew out of attempts to reform the church catholic in the sixteenth century. Such reform is committed to be ongoing and is guided "according to the Scriptures"—both Old and New Testaments—as the revealed Word of God.

The *Book of Church Order* (also known as the *BCO*) is more than the rule book of the RCA. It provides a way for us to live and work together as the body of Christ, following 1 Corinthians 14:40's admonition that "all things be done decently and in order." Order is a way to express our unity and achieve cooperation and harmony in the body of Christ as we seek to fulfill our mission. It's our theology lived out in the ways we live and work together.

We have **four offices** in the RCA. Three offices are involved in the government of the church: Minister of Word and Sacrament, elder, and deacon. A fourth office, General Synod professor, is employed in the seminaries or the Ministerial Formation Certification Agency for the training of students for the ministry. Those who are ordained to office act as servants who represent Christ through the action of the Holy Spirit.

A **consistory** combines the ministerial functions and governmental powers of the offices of the minister, elder, and deacon in the service and supervision of a local church. The whole body acts as the representative of the congregation.

Ministers are called to proclaim the gospel of Jesus Christ and to the ministry of the Word of God.

In the local church **elders** are chosen members of spiritual discernment, exemplary life, charitable spirit, and wisdom grounded in God's Word. Elders, together with the installed minister serving under a call and/or commissioned pastor/s (if any), are to have supervision of the church entrusted to them. They are set apart for a ministry of watchful and responsible care for all matters relating to the welfare and good order of the church. They are to study God's Word, to oversee the household of faith, to encourage spiritual growth, to maintain loving discipline, and to provide for the proclamation of the gospel and the celebration of the sacraments. They assist the minister with their good counsel and in the task of visitation. They seek to guard the sacraments of the church from being profaned. An elder may administer the sacraments, if authorized by the board of elders.

**Deacons** are chosen members of spiritual commitment, exemplary life, compassionate spirit, and sound judgment, who are set apart for a ministry of mercy, service, and outreach. They are to receive the contributions of the congregation and to distribute them under the direction of the consistory. The deacons give particular attention and care to the whole benevolence program of the church. They have charge of all gifts contributed for the benefit of the poor and distribute them with discretion. They visit and comfort those in material need and perform such other duties as the consistory may assign them.
