PASTOR'S PONDER

Tammy Renée sang and witnessed for those who attended the ecumenical Safe Summer Supper hosted here at Old Saratoga on the evening of Wednesday, June 25. In the words of one of her YouTube spots, this native of Tennessee –

"Shares a piece of her heart. Tammy is a gospel recording artist who has a heart for people. To show them the same love, mercy and grace that God showed her. To show the love of God to all with no judgment. Tammy Renee travels the country sharing her testimony, music and heart wherever God opens a door. She only goes for a love offering and loves on people. Tammy has sung on big and small stages, won a few awards and been nominated for several, including a Dove award.

Tammy brought with her on this multi-legged tour, her husband Lee and three teenage grandsons in an older model station wagon, pulling a small box trailer for her equipment behind. Her concert was from the heart and faithfully, throughout the vagaries of life, lyrically pointing to Jesus as our Lord and Savior, our Help and Guide. It was truly professional and very well packaged. Her voice, even following a heart attack with the medical notice that the intubation tubes will have altered her throat, is wonderful and true (think of the vocal quality of Loretta Lynn or Tammy Wynette). I wish more of the community had been able to come—but on that HOT early summer night, even moved indoors out of the worst of it into a much cooler Loomis Hall, the crowd we had at the buffet line and tables filled the space "just right" with fans blowing in every direction!

It was a joy for me to sit at the table with friends, neighbors, other church folks from around the area with their ministers, and hear the Good News of the sustaining love of God in Jesus Christ preached through Tammy's musical talent and testimony: a change of pace from my beloved Reformed Church tradition to be sure-- which is the point of ecumenism after all. We hold fast together to our common faith in Jesus Christ, and benefit by opportunities throughout the year to experience and share our traditions with one another.

I highly recommend that you make a point of attending the next occasion when we all come together in Christian fellowship and worship; it may be life-changing. It is certainly life-enhancing!

Hymns of Our Faith

Analysis and thoughts from Richard Behrens

"Sing to the Lord, ye saints of God. (Psalm 30:4)

"Pentecostal Power"

"Lord, as of old at Pentecost thou didst thy power display, With cleansing, purifying power, descend on us we pray.

Lord, send the old-time power, the Pentecostal power,

Thy flood gates of blessing on us throw open wide.

Lord, send the old-time power, the Pentecostal power,


That sinners be converted and thy name glorified."

With the fifty days of Easter having ended, we now enter the liturgical season of Pentecost. We recall Jesus' instructions to his disciples to gather and wait for the Holy Spirit to come upon them, empowering them to spread the Gospel to all the world, and to continue Jesus' ministry. Believers in our day are part of this tradition. We are bearers of the Good News, and we, like the first disciples, must be empowered and filled by the Holy Spirit.

In the two-thousand-year history of the Christian Church, spiritual revival was a phenomenon that occurred periodically, usually in response to rampant moral decline and a turning away from honoring God. The first, and most notable among several revivals, was the Great Awakening of the 1740s. The 19th century alone gave rise to several such revival movements. In many parts of America, the turning of the 19th to the 20th century was a time of spiritual revival, soon followed by spiritual decline during the "roaring twenties".

The hymn "Pentecostal Power" was written in the year 1912. Both its lyrics and melody reflect the revival spirit. The lyrics allude strongly to the Bible text found in the early chapters of the Book of the Acts of the Apostles and the ensuing ministries of the early Christians. References to the promise of the Holy Spirit, fire, power, and God's mighty deeds are evident in both.

Charles Hutchinson Gabriel (1856-1932), an lowan, was a composer and lyricist of gospel songs and tunes and is credited with over 7,000 musical works. He came from a "musical family" but is reported as having no formal training in music. He traveled extensively in the United States, spreading the joy that came from singing about God's love and mercy. Among his most loved hymns are "Send the Light," "Wonderful Love of Jesus," and "O That Will be Glory." His range of compositions was broad and included many sacred cantatas. He served as music director at Grace Methodist Episcopal Church in San Francsico. His later work in Christian music found him serving as an editor for Rodeheaver Publishing in Chicago.

Summer Mission Giving

Quarterly Mission: RCA World Missions

For over 375 years, RCA Global Mission has impacted millions around the world through God's love. They aim to partner with global churches in ways that are collaborative and mutually meaningful. Today around 100 RCA missionaries and partners are at work in over 30 countries across the globe, sharing ministries of compassion, developing leaders, and sharing the good news.

July Deacon's Mission: Things of My Very Own

Founded in 2008, Things of My Very Own provides crisis intervention services to children impacted by abuse/neglect, or at risk of a Child Protective Services intervention. Their goal is to keep children out of the foster-care system and with non-abusive family members, whenever possible. They offer transitional assistance for those leaving abusive situations, education programs for children who may have missed extensive amount of school, life skills development programs, and a shopping center to bridge the gap between crisis intervention services and independence. They also have a Family Crisis Intervention Initiative that aims to provide intensive case management to families with trauma induced mental health conditions that are at risk of child protective services intervention.

August Deacon's Mission: Wellspring

For over 40 years, Wellspring has provided domestic violence and sexual assault services for Saratoga County. All their services for survivors are free, confidential, and non-judgmental. They include emergency shelter, 24/7 hotline and live chat, counseling, long-term housing assistance, case management, etc. They also offer education, training, and prevention programs to the community, as well as free wellness programs.

RCA News

News from General Synod 2025

Several dozen leaders from within the Regional Synod of Albany were in Tucson, Arizona from June 5 to 10 to be part of the RCA General Synod. Over these six days there were inspiring times of worship, reports from many councils and committees, opportunities to hear from leaders within the denominations, and voting on a wide variety of motions. The most significant item of business was the final vote on restructuring. After the restructuring proposals were passed at the 2024 General Synod and were supported by a super-majority of classes, this year's General Synod made the final vote to have one level of assembly between consistories and General Synod. The functions of the classis and Regional Synod will now belong to a single assembly, to be officially called the Middle Assembly. All the changes will be implemented by December 30, 2026.

Middle Assembly Transition Teams: Are You Called to Serve?

The Regional Synod of Albany is embarking on a significant and hopeful transition toward the new "Middle Assembly" structure that is happening across the RCA.

To guide this process, as agreed at our May 5th annual meeting, two distinct Transition Teams are being formed. One team will focus on developing the "Upstate New York Middle Assembly Proposal." The second will shape a separate Middle Assembly initiated by a request from the Montgomery Classis.

These teams will spend the summer developing a clear vision, initial structure, and proposed function for each new body. Their foundational work will be presented for consideration at a special session of Albany Synod on Saturday, October 25, setting the course for our future doing God's work in this region.

This is a crucial moment for shaping what is to come. Albany Synod Executive Committee is building these teams with individuals who are committed to the future of the RCA, possessed of a vision for what could be, and willing to contribute their time and energy with generosity.

Beyond the primary team members, we are also seeking folks who have specific skills or expertise to offer as resource people.

Classis clerks are the primary source of recommendations for membership on the transition teams. However, ASEC is also open to receiving nominations from other quarters.
